Support for Families in Building Mathematical Understanding in their Children

Recently we have been informed of a helpful website that will support families to develop mathematical understanding for their young children. This has been a joint effort between Monash University, the Victorian Department of Education and Training and Catholic Education, Melbourne.

Findings from the research project tells us that there are many ways that families are engaging their children with mathematics, but that they also want early childhood education and care settings to do this more as well. The resources from this website form the beginning of how families can engage young children in learning about mathematics in everyday experiences.

The website is called Numeracy@HOME. Exploring the 11 ways can support families and educators to enrich children's knowledge and confidence in understanding and using mathematics.

Some of the categories for exploring and learning include:

1. COMPARE AND MEASURE

2. EXPLORING SHAPES

3. WHERE IS IT?

4. EXPLORING PATTERNS

5. USING TIME WORDS

6. EXPLORING TIME

And activities look like this:

Healthy Kids Corner



Perfect for breakfast, lunch or dinner these wonderful healthy ham and egg pies are delicious. Eat them hot with a salad or cold out of a lunchbox.

Ingredients

- oil spray
- 3 large slices lean ham (75g)
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 tbsp milk
- 3 spring onions (shallots), finely chopped
- 1/2 cup canned creamed corn or corn kernels
- 1 tbsp chopped basil
- 1/2 cup (40g) grated low fat tasty cheese
- salt and pepper

Method

- Heat oven to 200°C (180°C fan-forced) and spray 6 cups of a muffin tray. Line each cup with ham and set aside.
- Whisk eggs with milk, spring onions, corn, basil and grated cheese. Season with salt and pepper.
- Divide mixture among the 6 cups and bake for 25-30 minutes until pies are set in the middle.
- Remove from oven, run a blunt knife around the edge to loosen and allow pies to sit in the tray for 5 minutes.
- Remove pies from the muffin tray and enjoy with a salad.

RE News

When do I need faith in my life?

As an educator, I've had some pretty powerful questions in my time. As Year 5 & 6 begin to investigate this concept of 'Human Dignity', the teachers were posed with some very confronting questions from the students last week:

- When do I need faith in my life?
- If I'm not religious, do I need faith?
- What is faith?
- Is faith and hope one in the same?

Deep questions! Confronting questions! I think these questions are timeless and apply to all of us throughout our life's journey. When asked about these questions I was somewhat perplexed in how to answer - I needed time to think.

I suppose the first question is the most relevant - 'When do I need faith in my life?'...

Each Sunday my family and I attend Mass, either physically or online at Emu Plains. As I sat last Sunday listening to the readings, the answer to 'When do I need faith in my life?' was literally presented. Fr Paul began a reading from the Gospel of Matthew (14:22-33). The passage retells of a boat far out on the lake, which was carrying the disciples. As time went on a

storm grew and the boat began to battle heavy seas and wind. In the twilight of the morning, Jesus presented himself on the shore and began walking across the water towards them. The disciples were scared and thought it was a ghost. Jesus called out 'It is I! Do not be afraid'. Jesus called Peter to come and join him. Peter got up and out of the boat and began to walk across the water to Jesus, ..."but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped.'"

Each of us in our lives will make decisions that we believe to be right and sets us on one path over another. However, life can sometimes throw curve balls and fill us with uncertainty, anxiety, doubt and maybe even a sinking



feeling. Take for instance the situation we now face with COVID. We can hope for something better, but hope is usually tied to chance - it might happen, it might not. Faith is a little different. It is a deep knowing that it will be okay. Faith takes away all doubt, it stills our life. It grounds us. COVID will retreat and we will have normality restored over time, whatever that new reality brings.

Do you need to be religious to have faith? No, but sometimes in religion we find answers to these life-long questions.

St Mary of the Cross Mackillop Feast Day

Last Saturday marked the Feast Day of Australia's first saint - St Mary of the Cross Mackillop.

In celebrating this feast, on Friday 14th August we are asking students to come dressed in mufti (bright colours) and to have crazy hair! We are asking for a gold coin donation.

All monies raised will be donated to the Sisters of St Joseph (the order in which Mary Mackillio belonged). The Josephite sisters have a Mobile Kindergarten Program operating in Fiji, in which they are in need of more supplies, in which to provide educational opportunities to children in poor and remote communities.

<u>Please note</u> that we are asking students to have their hair done prior to coming into school. No coloured hairsprays are allowed on site.





Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable They need YOU to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.



No Parking

No waiting. You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick-up. You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.





No Stopping

You must not stop on a length of road with a No Stopping sign. The first 10m

from an intersection is a no stopping zone. Yellow kerb lines are also No Stopping zones

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Bus Zone

Only a public bus can stop in a bus zone.





Mobile Phones

Extra fines apply for using mobile phones in a school zone.



Speeding Offences



40km/h is the limit. Children are vulnerable, so slow down in school zones



Pedestrian Crossings

 In a gueue of traffic. no part of your vehicle can stop on a pedestrian crossing. 2. Do not let your child



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in or out of a vehicle at a pedestrian crossing as this is a No Stopping zone.

Driveways & Footpaths

PROME s330 POWER Do not park on or across a driveway or footpath

U turns

Illegal on or near a pedestrion crossing and across double white lines.



Double Parking

Double parking is illegal and is very dangerous in a school zone.
